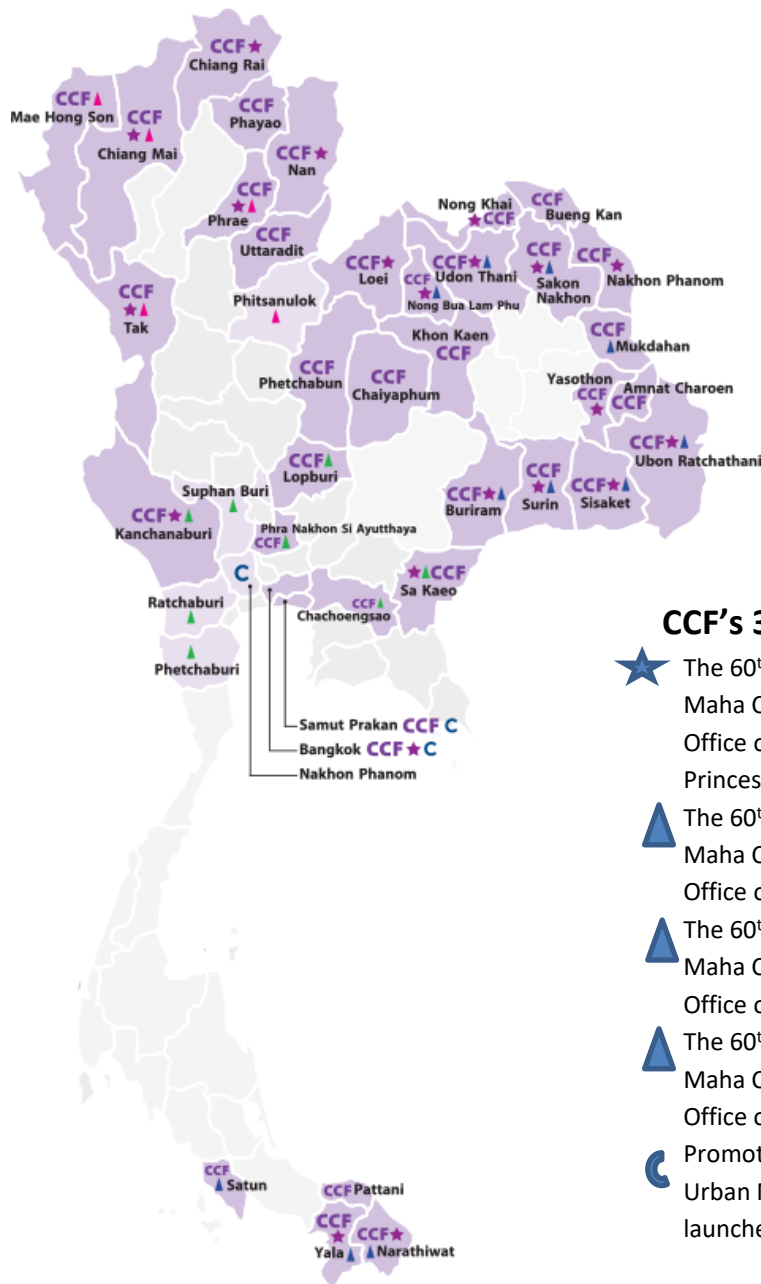

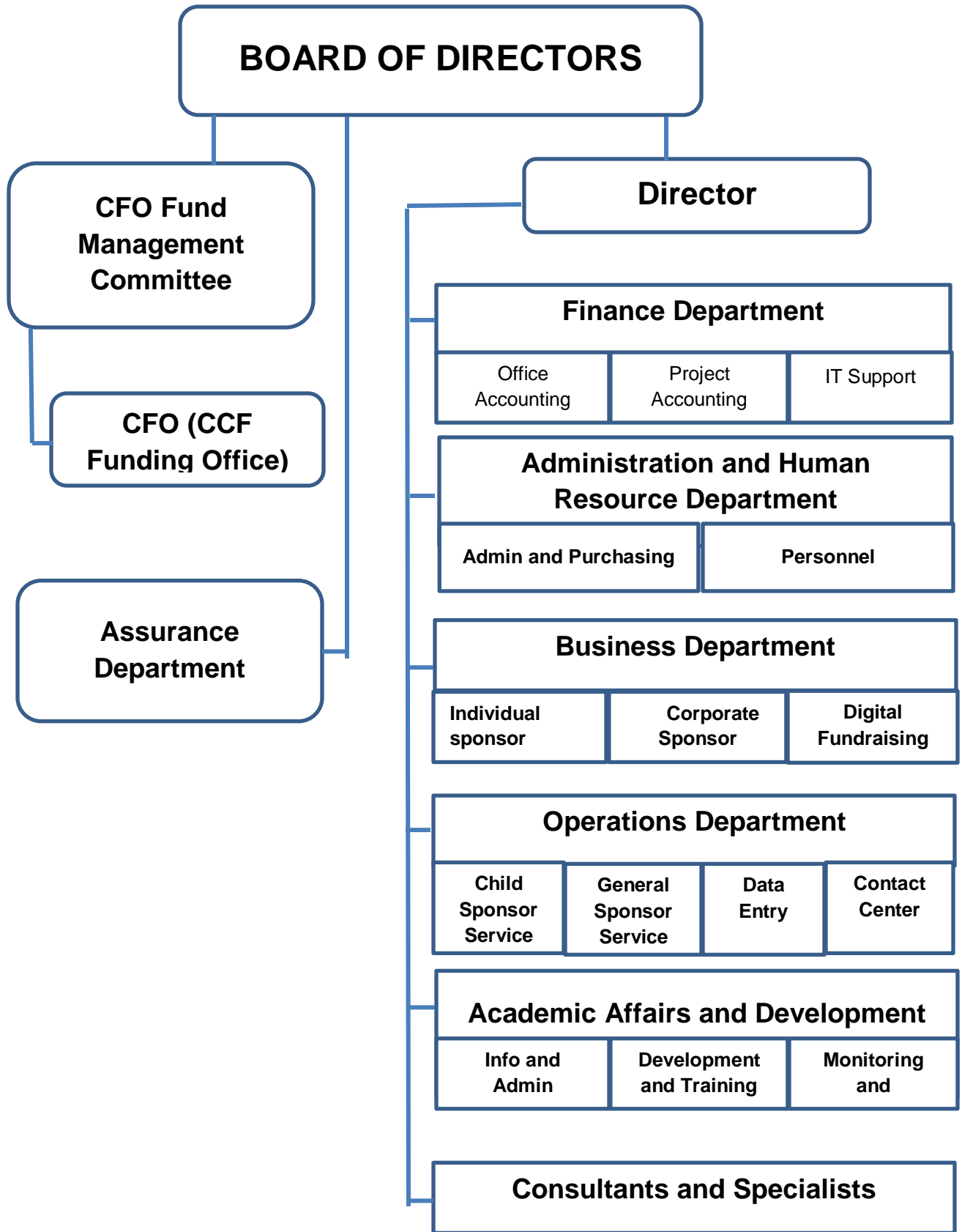
- 1957: Christian Children's Fund incorporated, based in the USA, started its operation in Thailand through its Hong Kong office

Throughout his 70 years and 4 months reign, he had performed so many activities especially visiting people in different parts of Thailand. These visits have turned into 4,447 royal projects which benefit disadvantaged Thai people.

EDUCATION OPPORTUNITY FOR DISADVANTAGED CHILDREN

Following the footsteps of our King

In memory and in recognition of H.M. King Bhumibhol’s work, CCF has adopted his working principal into our social development work.

“Education is the important factor in building and developing the knowledge, ways of thinking, behavior and ethics of people. Any societies and countries that are able to offer a good and integral education curriculum to youth will achieve having quality people who are able to preserve the prosperity and future growth of the country.”

An excerpt from the royal speech given to awarded teachers and students at Sala Dusidalai, Grand Palace’s Dusit Maha Prasat Throne Hall, on Monday, 27 July 1981.

H.M. King Bhumibhol always emphasized the importance of education for youth. He made several statements on this issue because the education is an important tool to fight against poverty and lift up the livelihood which will result in the future development of the country.

Therefore, CCF has followed his footsteps and made it our mission over the past 40 years to ensure that disadvantaged children will get the opportunity to study continuously.

Funding the support from the society has been mobilized to disadvantaged children in the form of scholarship to relieve the financial burden of their families. Children can afford to go to school until they complete the formal education curriculum. In

addition to the scholarship, the funding is used for improving the livelihood of these children and their families to have a better quality of life.

In the box: CCF pays respect before the Royal Urn of the late King Bhumibhol

On Wednesday, 12 July 2017, at 14:30 hours, Professor Dr. Varakorn Samakoses, President of CCF, together with the Board of Directors and the staff members co-hosted the Royal religious practice for the late King Bhumibhol at Grand Palace’s Dusit Maha Prasat Throne Hall.

“Throughout King Bhumibhol’s reign, He made livelihood development the first priority. He visited people in remote area and helped them improve their livelihood and create a career opportunity for them. Therefore, CCF has adopted the pathway given by the late King in the operation of our projects to promote a better living condition for children and their families as well as for these children to access education opportunity.” Dr. Kanchada Piriyarangsan, Director of CCF, said

At present, hundreds of thousand children have received the support from CCF while another 58,000 children are still under our sponsorship program. It is our serious mission to continue following the footsteps of our beloved King.

I, Miss Rachanee Sae Bohku, wish to make my resolution that I will behave according to our father’s teaching, to become a good child of my parents and the society. I will grow trees and will not conduct any deforestation.

I, Miss Kamolmal Yaehoh, wish to make my resolution to behave well in order to follow the footsteps of our “Father” that “I will pay attention to my study, be a good person and use my knowledge to develop my community.

I, Miss Woranan Jomwuth, wish to make my resolution to follow the footsteps of our father that I will help grow more forest, preserve natural resources and adopt the sufficiency economy philosophy in a way that benefits the society and myself.

I, Miss Salinthip Thongdonmuen, wish to make my resolution that I will behave well and will follow the footsteps of our father that I will be a good person, be economical and respect my parents.

I, Master Thongchai Kala, wish to make my resolution that I will be a good person of the society and will help others.

I, Miss Jarumon Kongkajamikorn, wish to make my resolution that I will behave well to follow the footsteps of our father that I will pay attention to my study and will help each other to grow more trees for him.

FOLLOWING SUFFICIENCY ECONOMY – Modest; Self-reliance; Solid Foundation

“Developing a country must be done step by step. First, the basic needs of the majority of people must be met by using proper technique but low cost equipment. Once the foundation is strong and solid, then, further steps can be implemented.” Above statement is cited from H.M. King Bhumibol’s speech on the graduation day of Kasetsart University students on 18 July 1974.

It can be said that the whole world recognizes the wisdom of our beloved late King Bhumibhol’s sufficiency economy philosophy. This new method of development is based on the happiness of people, being modest, self-reliance and balance with nature. It brings a sustainable development which helps and developing country to overcome its poverty. People do not need to enter the industrial market which even though would generate the income but not lead to a better quality of life.

CCF has used your donation money to improve the livelihood of children and their families through the implementation of different projects such as Home-based Food Security, Sufficiency Economy Youth Leaders and Modest Entrepreneur. With these projects, many families are able to have their own source of food. It is extended to enhance youth to establish its own business in the agricultural sector. Then, each

family would have a sustainable self-reliance and secure life under this volatile world.

Naruemol Sanitchoey (Noey), 15 years, from Amnatcharoen

Her average income from selling cricket is 3,000 Baht per month. This income is used for family expenses. Her family owns 14 rais of land which produces a ton of rice each year. The total income from selling a ton of rice is just above 10,000 Baht which means an average of less than 1,000 Baht per month.

“I collect vegetables and catch the fish in the paddy field for cooking to feed the family as well as selling them at the market as an additional income for the family’s daily expenses. When I become a Sufficiency Economy Youth Leader, I was “the given chicken, catfish and mushroom for home-based food supply. Then, I joined Sufficiency Economy Start-up program.” I’ve chosen “Selling Cricket” as the topic of my business plan because the product can be sold at a good price, 200 Baht per kilogram. My business plan has been approved and the funding support is provided.”

Noey said that she has received a very good income from selling cricket. Noey and her father would roast the cricket and sell them in the nearby villages. The average income per month is 3,000 Baht. This money is used for the family expenses including her study. Noey has expanded the production from four to ten stalls now. She intends to expand the business further. Even after Noey finishes her study, she intends to continue this business because it can generate an additional income for her family.

Wuthinan Seesuay (Thor), 17 years

“Not only that spending in our home town is lower than in Bangkok but we are happier as well. I am confident that the earthworm business that I’ve just started up will generate enough income for me and my family. The first batch was sold in just one month after the start-up. Thor started raising earthworm three months ago. CCF approved of his business plan and provided him with 4 kilograms of earth worm and 4 cement tanks. I intend to expand to 6 tanks and more. I am looking for a new

market so I can expand the business further. The selling price is good and the cost is low. The selling price of the breeders is as high as 600 Baht per kilogram while the regular one is 300 Baht per kilogram.”

“Every part of the earthworm is useful. The waste can be turned into organic fertilizer. I used them in my farm so I can lower the expenses on fertilizer. I managed to buy chicken out of the income generated from selling earthworm. Thor said that his life has been much better after joining the Sufficiency Economy Youth Leader and Sufficiency Economy Start-up projects. He has received the support from CCF in the form of seeds, fish to breed and items needed to breed earthworm. With these factors, he is confident that he and his family will survive by adopting modest way of life.

Adisak Dejbumrung (Pond), 16 years

Pond has joined the Sufficiency Economy start-up projects 5 months ago. He has chosen to set up shrimp farm as it has always been his dream. The income generated from the two shrimp ponds is used for family expenses and his study.

“I plan to expand the shrimp farm further so it will generate the revolving fund in the future. When it is the time that I attend the university, my sibling will continue to look after this business including the fish and vegetables that we have grown to reduce the family expenses, increase the income as well as following the sufficiency economy that the late King has taught us.

Sarawut Suriya (Tah), 15 years

Tah has been selected to join Sufficiency Economy Youth Leader program. Other than receiving plant and animal to breed, Tah has the opportunity to go on study tour to learn and to be able to apply his knowledge to his project.

As the result of Sufficiency Economy training, Tah understands “financial discipline”. He prepares book-keeping for the family. He records every transaction about his egg business such as daily output of the egg, daily income and expenses and even health status of each chicken. “I must do the record so I know my 20 chickens lay 10

– 17 eggs per day and the selling price is 20 Baht for 7 eggs. I sell some eggs and keep some for the family. However, the average income is almost 300 Baht per week. The income is used for re-investment, daily food and saving for his future study,” Tah said.

To date, the 15 year old boy is still helping his neighbor by sharing the knowledge he received from the training to the community. Some of the examples are the production of EM ball to improve the quality of polluted water, the production of organic fertilizer, making biogas from pig’s waste. The objective of Sufficiency Economy Youth Leader and Sufficiency Economy Start-up is met. Youth leaders become Sufficiency Economy Learning Center building a strong self-reliance community by practicing Sufficiency Economy given by our beloved late King.

SUFFICIENCY ECONOMY YOUTH LEADERS project has been implemented since 2012. There are 4,368 youth leaders in 23 provinces.

During 2016 – 2017, 1,235 youths in 25 provinces have participated in this project.

841 youths or 86.16% (from 976 respondents) still continue the activity with a visible outcome.

95 youths continue with the activity and are able to upgrade themselves to be a sufficiency economy start-up.

Sufficiency Economy Start-up

- Learning how to make a business plan, able to write a business plan
- Ability to plan a saving of one-fourth of the total income

648 or 66.39% share the output to neighbors.

752 or 77.04% spend in an economical way and make a daily saving in different forms.

152 or 15.57 sell the excess from daily basic needs to earn an additional income.

CCF provides training on making flowers for the Royal Cremation

CCF joined hand with entrepreneurs, corporate companies and department stores in holding 14 trainings to make the flower “Dararat” or “Daffodil” that will be used in the Royal Cremation Ceremony of H.M. King Bhumibhol.

CCF Organized Special Activities to Bring the Royal Wishes into Practice.

To express our loyalty, our sorrow, and to share with the public information on the benevolence of our late King, especially to our younger generations, for them to be inspired to do good deeds, CCF initiated special activities under the theme “In Following Our Father’s Footsteps”.

CCF has created a special page in our website for the public to sign messages of condolence for our late King Bhumibol Adulyadej. 6,747 people participated in this activity during 13 October 2016 - 20 January 2017.

On 22 November 2016, CCF brought 471 children from Chiangmai, Maehongson and Tak to the Grand Palace, Bangkok as the representatives of all CCF children all over Thailand. Children paid respect in front of the Royal Urn of the late King Bhumibol and joined the group singing of the Royal Anthem with great power and pride.

23,407 children participated in these special activities organized by CCF in 29 provinces. Together, they conveyed their feelings towards the late King into the writing “Resolution on Following Our Father’s Footsteps”.

HIGHLIGHTS OF 2016 – 2017

CCF operates in many different dimensions with the goal to uplift the quality of life and create education opportunity for the disadvantaged children. Our activities include emergency support to children who are facing life crisis. These programs are run in network with the local partners, public and private sectors to ensure the support reaches those in needs.

Other than providing direct support to children, we also help their families and communities. All of these supports have been made so that children would grow up with a good quality of life, getting proper education, managing to get out of poverty and turning themselves to help their families and society in the future.

DO YOU KNOW THAT

200,000 Thai children age 6 – 14 years (compulsory age for formal education) failed to enter the formal education system. 8,814 children in public school dropped out of school **because of poverty.**

The data from The Secretariat Council of Education, Ministry of Education, shows that during 2014 – 2015, 7,174 million children between 6 and 14 years (formal education age) enrolled in the formal education system. The population data shows there are 7,438 million children or 96.5% which shows that about 200,000 children fail to enter the school system. 8,814 children could not continue their study because of the poverty.

The data also shows that out of children enrolled in Prathom 1, only 66.4% completed the high school level.

INCREASE OPPORTUNITY FOR EDUCATION

PATH TO THE FUTURE FOR CCF CHILDREN

Our main objective is to push children into the formal education by minimizing any obstacles and increasing help both direct and indirect for children to remain in the system until they obtain a bachelor degree. We also develop teaching and learning tools so that schools located in the remote area will be able to provide a better quality education.

OUTCOME

- 1) Allocate 146.92 million Baht to 53,267 children in 34 provinces in the form of annual scholarships from kindergarten to university level (including children with inability to attend school and children before entering kindergarten). This support is provided to reduce the financial burden from their families, so the chance is better for them to complete university level.
- 2) Partnering with the Area Education Office in 6 provinces (Satun; Narathiwat; Ayudhya; Lopburi; Chachoengsao and Bureerum) and local partner organizations to promote the learning through STEM method or learning via Science; Technology; Engineering and Mathematics.
The training has been organized for 163 teachers from 62 schools at primary and secondary levels to participate. 62.90% of teachers have extended the knowledge back into their school.
- 3) The “Southern Child Smiles Again” project provided scholarships to 124 children from 56 schools in the south of Thailand. These children have been impacted from the loss of their parents from the political unrest.
- 4) Provided Chalermprakiat 80 years of King Rama 9 scholarships to 55 children in the amount of 1,008,000 Baht.
- 5) Provided the training for 491 people to become a story teller. Those include mothers; parents; teachers and youth leaders.
426 people or 87.76% have told the story regularly to their families or at least twice a week.

84.11 % have said that children listen to the story with interest. Children have improved the concentration and increase the ability to create an imagination.

6) 54,378 children participated in the Happy Saturday event organized in 36 provinces as a creative and learning space in the community or school.

Organized the activities for children and their parents to both take part.

These activities are arts, financial discipline, occupation skill; ethics. Children must take part in this course regularly at least 8 times per year.

DO YOU KNOW THAT

Thai children (under 5 years) have been facing chronic shortness for almost 15 years now. The statistics show that 16% of Thai children are shorter than the standard height and many of them are chronically malnourished.

The latest data in 2016 shows that one out of five of the world's populations have malnourishment issues. Among 42 million of children under 5 years, 161 million are having the shortness issue.

In Thailand, the data in 2012 shows that 16% of children under 5 years suffers from having chronic malnourishment. They are shorter than the average standard height and their brain is not fully developed. The situation has not been improved. The latest data in 2016 shows that more Thai children are having lower than standard weight. 16% of children from new born to 5 years are shorter than standard height. Thai children have become shorter than the standard height in the past 10 to 15 years.

IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF LIFE

Thank you for helping children to fill their stomach and sleep warmly.

Your donation has been used to develop many projects with the goal to improve the livelihood of children and their family members, reduce malnutrition rate and add daily basic needs. Children are able to live a normal life or as close as other families in the same age and having enough basics to continue their education.

FILL STOMACH, PROVIDE GOOD NUTRITION, AND GAIN INCOME

Kittisak Thankitsakul (Film), Sobmoey, Maehongson

Kittisak's mother told us that "I only eat roast rice curry with vegetables and bamboo shoot collected around the house compound. I seldom eat meat because it is expensive. The price of chicken is 140 Baht per kilogram. The cost of one chicken is equal to one day wage. I cannot afford to buy it. After I join the home-based food security project, I've received chicken and fish for breeding. I have a better quality meal, having chicken twice or three times per week."

Film's family is Karen. They live on a high hill. There are 6 members in the family. Film is the youngest. He has two brothers, father, mother and grandmother. Only the father can earn an income. Mostly, he works as a construction worker. It is not every day that he can find a job, so the income is not enough to support the family. They have rice from their own 3 rais of land and then collect vegetables and bamboo shoots for their meals.

Film enrolled in the Home-based Food Security project because of his poverty. Seeds, breeding animals as well as necessary equipment have been given to Film's family so the family does not have a shortage of food. It also ensures that Film and his family will receive proper nutrition.

Film's mother said that first she received 7 chickens and now it becomes 28. She intends to expand this number further so she has a more frequent food supply. "Sometimes I share chicken with my neighbors or sell them at a cheap price, 20 Baht or 80 Baht. I do not expect any profit from my neighbors but rather sharing with them. We live on the sufficiency economy philosophy. Though we earn small income but we grow vegetables and breed animals for our food. The excess can be sold or given to or exchanged with neighbors. She said that home-based food security project is very good. It helps reduce the daily expenses and create better food supply for our family.

OUTCOME

1) Breakfast for Kids

3,489 children from 77 schools, 22 provinces and 6 communities have been able to have breakfast before the school begins. Children are better focused on their study. It also helps reduce malnourish cases in Thai children.

2) Home-based Food Security

2,556 skipped generation families from 28 provinces have been provided with seeds and animal breed to be used for their daily need. This helps solve the

malnourishment problem issue in a sustainable way and it helps reduce the family expense.

3) Hygiene Kits

32,067 children from 33 provinces have received hygiene kits worth 12.4 million Baht for their daily hygiene and improve their discipline on sanitation.

CHILD RESCUE FUND FOR UNDER-PRIVILEGED CHILDREN

This project has been established since 2012. The donation is used to support children who are facing a life crisis and need to be rescued on an emergency basis, so they return to a normal life or as close to normal life as possible. It can be classified into two groups, children with severe chronic illness and children living with ill-parents or extremely poor parents and unable to look after the children.

ACHIEVEMENTS

208 children who are facing life crisis have been saved.

2.49 million Baht has been spent to foster 67 children who are having critical illness and 141 children from 30 provinces whose parents are ill or extremely poor and unable to look after their own children.

- 62 children with illness received continuing medical care and regularly visited the doctor.
- 141 children who are taken care of by senior citizen in the family have been given support for home repair, food supplement, mosquito net, blanket and household equipment.

HOME REPAIR FOR CHILD RESCUE

CCF coordinates with private sector to help in home repair or build a new house for children living in just under the shed.

ACHIEVEMENTS

For children to have a more appropriate home, CCF has built and repaired 75 houses in 22 provinces using the budget of 897,000 Baht.

DO YOU KNOW THAT

In 2015, 15.3% (104,289) of overall birth in Thailand (679,502) were from teen mothers aged around 10 – 19 years old. 101,301 were teen mothers aged 15 – 19 years, or 277 teen births per day and the youngest was only 8 years old. The average age of having the first sexual relationship is 13 – 15 years.

A 2015 report by Bureau of Reproductive Health, Department of Health, Ministry of Public Health shows the teen pregnancy rate is increasing each year.

2003

1,791 teen birth cases were from 10 – 14 years teen mothers or 0.7% of the same population age (2.38 million).

2015

2,988 teen birth cases or 8 teen births per day from the same population age (1.96 million). The ratio is 1.5 teen births per every 1,000 population.

2016

101,301 teen birth cases or 277 teen births per day from the same population age 15 – 19 years (2.26 million). The ratio is 44.8 teen births per every 1,000 population.

The youngest teen mother is 8 years.

The average age of having the first sexual relationship is 13 – 15 years.

True Love Must Be Safe - Protection

ACHIEVEMENTS

1,114 children from 91 schools in 20 provinces have participated in the training on Understanding Sexual Health. They will then share the knowledge with their peers.

56.28 % of the youth leaders have changed their sexual behavior at a very good rate. All 1,114 youths understand reproductive health and transfer this knowledge to their peers through role play, radio broadcast and posters.

UNDERSTANDING SEXUAL HEALTH

Reduce Teen Pregnancy

“This is my direct experience. My sister was forced to make an abortion when she became pregnant. I think learning about proper sexual relations is necessary. Now, my sister had to leave school before finishing Mathayom 4 to take care of her child. She lost her future. Luckily, I managed to convince my grandparents not to bring my sister to do the abortion”. Laksika (Oy), 17 years, CCF youth leader said.

Oy has immediately applied the knowledge she learned from the training organized by CCF with her sister’s case. She used techniques such as building trust, convince and persuade her grandparents to change their minds. I am proud that I can save a life and at the same time giving an opportunity to people who have made a mistake. They can be happily existed to take care of themselves as well as people around them.

Since then, Oy and her friends altogether 4 of them have led many activities to help educate their peers to understand sexual health and give some advice. Most of the issues are about the teen love, argument and how to use a condom.

Oy and her friends also lead activities in other communities and schools to help building the right attitude towards sexual health. “It is necessary to make them understand. Some of them misunderstand that external ejaculation prevents pregnancy. They do not understand how to protect themselves and have negative attitude towards condom. The most important thing for girls is that they must dare to say “No”. They must know how to get out of risky situations. They must refuse to have sexual relation and not be afraid to be separated with their boyfriends.

Oy believes that giving the knowledge and building attitude towards safe sex helps reduce sexual relations and early pregnancy. Some of my friends have begun to change their attitude and so there are fewer problems now.

Jirabhorn (Dao), 19 years, is the leader from the first batch of the training since Mathayom 3. She is now in the second year in Rajabhat Srisaket, Faculty of Science majoring in Public Health. Dao leads activities both in the school and in the

community such as shadow play and walk rally to build the right understanding about sexual health.

“It is very important to help other people to understand safe sex. For example, I now live on my own far away from my parents. They do not know my daily activity. If we know how to say “no”, how to protect ourselves, how to avoid being in the risk situation, then we will be safe and able to complete our education.

Dao told us that at the beginning her mother does not want her to become the youth leader because she has to come home late at night and lose her holiday. However, her mother is so proud of her after seeing how she has transformed, from being a shy girl to becoming confident in public speaking. This year, her mother has also joined the CCF training.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT

Promoting Income Generating and Financial Skills for Urban Marginalized Youths (CCF Teen Entrepreneurs)

Unawan Manjai, Deputy Director, Sothsuksa School, Nakornpathom, which is the secondary school for children with hearing disability, said that there is plenty of occupation skill training. However, the financial skills and teen entrepreneur course that CCF organized together with Citi Foundation have built the strong will for youths to establish their small business after they finish the school.

Unawan said that no one expects children with hearing disability to continue their study at a higher level. It is impossible for them to become a doctor. We want to see them become self-reliance and live with pride. Therefore, most of the training course is on vocational skill. However, it depends on each particular person which career they are interested in. At least, the financial skills and teen entrepreneurs have built strong will for these youths to have their own business. Training on financial skills and business plan writing has built the confidence that they can really become an entrepreneur.

Among the 60 youths attended the training, it has been divided into three groups namely bakery; ice-cream and Thai dessert. At present, students have opened simulation companies selling bakery and Thai dessert. Both products should be selling well because this is a boarding school. In addition, the products are sold in

the market every last Friday of the month which is the day parent pick-up their children from school.

Unawan noticed that the change is obvious. Children are very serious in doing the business. This is because they have changed their attitude towards career. Having the chance to do on-the-job training in different business types has inspired them to dream of having their own business. The training at “Coffee Bean by Dao” was beneficial because children can see the reality as well as practicing. Children with hearing disability are not able to learn by heart but having to learn by doing. They were so excited during the visit to Siam Paragon which helped open up new aspects of thinking. Seeing tempted sweets and beautiful shops has created the inspiration to establish their own business.

Financial skills training have also changed the spending behavior. Usually, school has set up the school bank account for children’s saving. However, after receiving the training, children make more saving. They even compete in making saving. They know how to divide their spending, keeping a portion and not spend them all.

Finally, Unawan said that though teachers were exhausted but it is worthwhile because children gained the experience as well as the inspiration. The most important factor is for children to have self-reliance which would benefit them.

1st Training

Build an understanding about saving and training to be an entrepreneur of the 21st century; provide definition of an entrepreneur; share success story from Thao Kae Noi, Food & Marketing, Coffee Beans by Dao, Bar-B-Q Plaza, Alibaba Group and Facebook.

2nd Training

Make a plan on saving, prepare financial statement, record income and expenditures, source of fund and technique on how to make more saving. The training skill for an entrepreneur is to begin with designing the business structure, selecting the type of business, preparing daily operations plan, selecting the methodology and risk analysis.

3rd Training

Enhance saving skills and how to make a saving that would earn more than just a regular saving. Understanding the liquidity for an entrepreneur which includes Business Model canvas and creative marketing.

4th Training

Risk analysis skill 4Es for digital marketing.

5th Training

Conclude the training with the glossary of financial terms and investment. Become a creative entrepreneur.

During the business competition in November 2016, 64 students from 15 youth clubs have submitted their business plan and answered questions asked by the committee. The winning team is “The P.K. Ice-cream” which proposes to produce ice-cream in squid flavor to offer the unique and delicious product.

FROM THE SPONSORS

The Worthwhile Giving

Khun Jumbhot Prairattanakorn (Jimmy) has become our sponsor for three years. While he was conducting his audit for CCF, he felt that he needed to understand better the nature of the work, so he has adopted two children.

“I have bought them bicycles because I want to know if children will receive them. From my audit experience, I must admit that CCF spent a higher percentage of donation to children and less on their own operation cost. My inspiration has come from this strength and I have contributed continuously for the past 3 years.”

Khun Jimmy has now 3 sponsored children. He told us that “I am glad and proud that I could help the under-privileged children. The money I paid is so worthwhile because children benefit from it. The amount of money may sound little comparing to our cost of living but it becomes so valuable for these children.”

Khun Jimmy has shared his opinion that giving the opportunity for education and improving the livelihood for children is a very important thing that should be done. If they do not receive education, they will only find a low income job with limited choicely like a construction worker and labor work. Soon, they will have children and when they cannot afford to take care of their children, they would send them to their parents in their home town. Then, the cycle begins again from one generation to another. On the other way round, if they have the opportunity to study further, they will have more job options, then, will be able to get out of this cycle and so will no longer become the problem of the society.

Giving the Opportunity, Building a Good Society

Khun Min Ingthanate (Jack), President and Founder of SVOA Public Co. Ltd. has sponsored 100 children in Lopburi and Ayudhya. Other than feeling empathy for the children’s difficult life, the reason that Khun Jack sponsors so many children is because he sees that giving the opportunity is the most direct way to solve social issues. “I think all children are born innocent. They are not the problem but the problem is the unfavorably situation to give these children any opportunities, their families and even environmental issues. All these undesirable factors cause them to become problem children. It is a good thing to have CCF works to support these children.”

Khun Jack mentioned that we have two choices, one is to disregard them but the result will be that we have more problems. Another choice is to give them the support, give them our hands. Finally, they will become the assets of the society and not the problem. “Would it be good if we live well in a big mansion but have to watch carefully because we do not feel safe? On the other way round, if we live in the society that are filled good people, we would feel safe and happy. Therefore, we should help each other hand in hand. The big problem will become smaller. If we do not extend any help, the situation will turn to be a major one. Finally, it will not be a pleasant place to live.”

Khun Jack emphasizes that he values education because education can change life. “Education is the basic right of every human being. If they are educated, no one would want to be a bad person, a problem maker, a criminal or a thief. It is a pity that the society has never given them any opportunities. Children are like a white cloth and it is up to us if we paint a beautiful or an evil picture on it.

Breeding chicken for lunch, Ban Lampongphet School

“I thank you for your kindness in giving me chicken, chicken food, mushroom and items needed to grow sunflower at my home. My grandmother and I collect mushroom and sunflower to cook for our meals and sell them as our additional income. I also learn to record the household book-keeping.”

The funding supported by Khun Jack has made it possible for children from 4 schools in Lopburi to attend science camp.

The More You Give, the More You Receive

Khun Somyos Wongthongsalee, Managing Director, Koranit Construction Co., Ltd., is not just another CCF sponsors but what made him special is he supports both in terms of money and labor work. He volunteers to build houses for the under-privileged children without being paid. 11 houses, worth more than 710,000 Baht, have been completed in Chaiyapoom, Lopburi and Phetchaboon.

Khun Somyos has seen photos of the ruin houses from the leaflet that CCF send to the sponsors and so he immediately decided to make houses for these children. “The house is made of aluminum sheet. There is no toilet and no wall. I am

extremely shocked, not realizing these situations are still existed in Thailand. I have decided to build and repair houses for those in need.”

Before helping to build houses for CCF children, Khun Somyos helps renovate almost 10 schools in the staff’s home town every year. Our construction workers are from the provinces. They are rather poor and so we want to compensate for them. If they are well motivated, they would work happily for us because they do not have to worry if their children would have a good place to study.

Khun Somyos said that the giving he has made is to show to public the real situation. Construction work produces a decent profit and so he can afford to provide the support. He and the board members want to give back to the society and this has become the company’s policy. By making this merit, the morale of staff has also increased.

For giving Moss a real home

Two years ago, Chanon Boonsorn (Moss)’s house was situated in an isolated paddy field. The house was hit by a heavy thunderstorm and only the remaining was left behind. The whole family had to live temporary with their relatives while waiting for the loan to build a new house.

Moss’s mother said that the original house was just the aluminum shed with cement floor. There was no electricity, water nor stability which was why it was totally damaged by the storm. The whole family, father, mother, Moss’s sister, nephew and Moss had to stay with their relatives. They sought loans to repair the house.

With the small amount of money they had, a new shelter was built with just one small room for 5 of them. The house was built on the edge of the pond and soon afterwards the floor collapsed. Koranit Construction Co. Ltd. has extended their support through CCF to help with the repair for Moss.

A real home was constructed comprising of 3 bedrooms, the new toilet was installed and the new roof is much stronger.

Moss's mother said that she was very happy that someone has built a new house for her. The new house is more comfortable and the safety is better.

However, Moss's family is still having a burden on large loan. The interest rate is as high as 3% per month. The family daily earning is just a small amount of money. They own a small piece of land for growing rice for the family. The excess is sold out for an additional income of 6,000 Baht. It is used to pay out the interest on the loan.

Moss said that this is the first time he has his own room. He is very happy that he has the privacy which helps him to better do his home-work and study.

Moss's first house may not be as beautiful as others but they are happy for their real home. They are grateful for this support. It is not easy for poor people to own a house, and do not even talking about how to pay back on the loan.

Every year we celebrate our birthday by "receiving". Next year, let's change to celebrate by "giving".

The saving from a smaller piece of cake or a bit lower value of present can help change the life of those in desperate.

The price of COW is 15,000 Baht, ransom the cow creates sustainable income generating

A cow is like a piggy bank for a family. Within 3 years, it gave birth to a calf and so we were able to generate income to cover the family's expenses as well as education.

"Special thanks to the sponsor for giving me the birthday gift. This cow is the first birthday present I have ever received. Usually, my birthday is just like another day. I've never received a present from my parents like my friends do. I wish I could have a birthday party, blow the candle on the cake, have a lot of sweets, have birthday present and have many friends to join my birthday party. There will never be that day. However, there is a miracle this year. I've received a big present. I name her "the most beautiful Mali". Nong Oat, Surin.

150 fries for 500 Baht

Fish is the useful source of nutrition for everyone. It generates income for breeding fish. Children learn to have discipline through looking after the fish, giving food and cleaning the pond. They also learn to do simple agriculture.

“Thank you for giving me the fries. They have grown up now. I cook them for my children. I can also reduce the family expenses.” Wisuta Promsri’s parents, Nongkhai.

Away from Diseases, Clean Toilet 8,500 Baht

Toilet condition for many of the under-privileged children is very poor. Only the partition existed without the roof. The toilet could not be closed and in general was not in a proper hygienic condition having full of germs which create a health issues for children and their family.

“Thank you for giving me a new toilet. The old toilet was ruined. I was afraid others could see me. The new toilet is new, clean and entirely closed. I am very happy.” Nicha, Nan.

CCF HAPPINESS SHARING NEWS

Khun Duangrat Watthanapongchat, Deputy Managing Director, representative from KT Semico Security Ltd. donated 200,000 Baht to support and promote education for disadvantaged children through CCF.

Community Children Foundation together with Citi Foundation organized a business plan competition to encourage young entrepreneurs and career choices. 64 student entrepreneurs from 15 clubs in 5 pilot schools presented their business plans on the stage.
